An Icon to His Community

My name is Sylvester Hood Sr. born November 29th 1918. I was a productive citizen in the Pleasant Hill Community for nearly eight and a half decades. I have helped many people, and many people have helped me over the years. Many of you are here today and I thank you for honoring me this way. I have supported you the best that I could over the years through the goods and services my family and I provided you. As I looked back over my life I have done many things but one thing I am most proud of is the time I spent servicing this great nation of ours as a United States Marine. I was in the second battalion of Negroes ever accepted into the Marine Corps during World War II. I was assigned to the 2nd Marine division in Camp Lejeune North Carolina. We trained at Montford Point, North Carolina and mobilized to Saipan, Japan where I worked the ammunition dumps and the mess decks of Hawaii. I even guarded Japanese prisoners after America bombed Hiroshima and Nagasaki. I attained the rank of Corporal. After I finished my service in the Marine Corps from December 27, 1943 to March 9, 1946. I came back home and worked beside you in the job markets of Meridian and St. Louis but I never lost my passion and desire to work Mama and Papa's farm. After awhile I stopped working on public jobs and started farming full time producing livestock, cotton, and fresh vegetables while raising eleven children; three including Jewel preceded me in death. Jewel and I always tried to teach our children right from wrong. You may also remember when I worked in the church as Assistant Sunday School Superintendent, served on the Board of Trustees, Boy Scout Master and Graveyard Coordinator. I was a devoted Husband, Father, and Icon of the Community. As a scoutmaster I valued having the ability to train and develop the young boys of our community and watch them grow up to become men. I required my scouts to learn the Boy Scout Oath. I also taught the Oath to my sons. I can hear those kids now:

SCOUT OATH

*On my honor I will do my best
To do my duty to God and my country
and to obey the scout law;
To help other people at all times;
To keep myself physically strong,
mentally awake, and morally straight.*
